A Gift of Life Rev. Tom Inch, Interim Parish Pastor

When the letter came, I didn't think much of it, at first. It was not the first letter that I had received from the Red Cross asking me to donate. I happen to have the type of blood that everyone can use, so they like to see me as often as they can. But this one was different. It was not my blood they were after this time.

It seems that I was a close match for a bone marrow transplant.

Cindy and I had entered the bone marrow data base a few years ago when they were seeking a match for a young man in Santa Barbara. Soon after the blood was taken, I forgot about the need and what we had done, until...

It took a while to get schedules together so that I could make the trip to

Ventura to give another sample of blood. I am fascinated by the process that one goes through to donate or get tested. I am fascinated even more by the withdrawal of blood. I don't watch myself get poked, but I do watch the blood as it fills vial and sack. Somehow, contained in this dark red liquid is the stuff of life. If not enough of the right kind can be found, or the supply is tainted, others suffer, even die. It is an awesome thought as I watch the life drain from my arm only to be given to another.

But this was different. I asked, "Who is he? Who needs my marrow and how serious is it? Will I get to meet this person? And one more thing, if I am able to donate marrow, will it hurt?" Deep inside of me it was this last question that was most important, though it

wouldn't stop the process. The woman who was taking the blood from my arm looked at me and responded by saying, "You haven't been told anything?" "No, only that I am a close match for someone," I said. "I'm assuming that if you are seeking marrow it is serious, even terminal."

She rifled through her papers looking for what information she

could give me. "He's a young man, in his thirties. There are two processes that can be used to harvest marrow, but the doctor will decide which is best for the one receiving. At worst it will feel like you got hit in

the lower back. You will be sore and stiff for a couple of days. But the doctor will decide what is best for the patient. And yes, arrangements will be made to try to get you and the recipient together after the transplant.

The words were a shock, the first concern is for the recipient. Whatever is done will be done to assure his health and recovery first.

Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem...He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child. While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child. And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.

—Luke 2:4-7

So we come to the Gift of Life. In concern for and love of the creation, God sent the Son to be born among us. Not in palace or mansion; not in a bustling metropolis; not before a gathered crowd of humanity, but in a small country on the edge of the known world, in the common room of the family home, among the animals. In concern and love for the creation God sent his only Son to be among us, to be one with us. Here is the Gift of life—come in unknown ways to an unsuspecting world.

Message from the EWAID Synod Bishop, Martin Wells

There are Bits and Pieces of things to report this month:

- I know I've shared this with you before, but it doesn't hurt to do it again:

A prayer for your new "red book" or electronic calendar, 2011: "You document my past, herald my future, and focus my now. You remind me of friends, keep me on time, and tell me the where. I treasure your memories, relish your promise, and thrive on your hope. Please God, a blessing on all that I do each day of this year." We thank you God for the gift of Time and the hope of a New Year. AMEN

- If you haven't had a chance to see my piece sent out to congregations for the Annual Meetings, that piece can be found on the Synod website, www.ewaidsynod.org. The notion of "begendings" is very real at the first of the New Year. There is much that is hopeful, not much to be optimistic about! I pray that we will press into the servant life of Jesus, holding fast to those who yearn for the hope which we bear! Lean into the story of Mary and Joseph and their trust in God. Lean into the arms of the infant Jesus who from his first breath was issuing an invitation to compassionate love. This is where we find the hope that does not disappoint. (Romans 5:5).
- Speaking of beginnings and endings, I'm rereading the classic "Managing Transitions" by William Bridges, Da Capo Press, 3rd Edition, 2009. His introduction begins with a quote from Herodotus, a Fifth Century

B.C. Greek Historian: "Diseases always attack [people] when they are exposed to change." Those of us who have studied Family Systems Theory on behalf of congregations know that "dis-ease," usually conflict, is always in the wings when change blows through a congregational system. As Chapter One of the Bridges' book confirms, "It isn't the changes that do you in, it's the transitions!" Systems theory (Steinke, "A Door Set Open," p. 2) would say "'Transformation involves crisis.'" [Crisis: the root is Greek "krisis," meaning a sundering or separation. Things come apart.] These days call for our most mature leaders to show up and offer confidence to others who are frightened using the gifts of "wise counsel, clear understanding, and simple trust" (1 Cor 12:4ff, The Message).

- Prayers are raised for each of you who will meet in Annual Meeting this month. Please keep the Synod Council in your prayers as well. A difficult budget, the reorganization of priorities, and goals under our Guiding Principles will all be on the agenda. Please keep the synod staff—Cathy, Laurel, and Mark—in your prayers as new sacrifices are asked of them.

ELCA Members Total 15 in 112th Congress

Fifteen members of the 112th U.S. Congress are members of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), including three in the U.S. Senate and 12 in the U.S. House of Representatives, according to staff with the Lutheran advocacy offices in Washington. The ELCA members are among 26 Lutherans in the new Congress, which will convene Jan. 5, 2011, in Washington. This includes Congressman Norm Dicks who returns to represent the 6th district in Washington State.

"We are looking forward to greeting both the new and returning Lutheran members," said the Rev. Andrew D. Genszler, director of advocacy, ELCA Washington Office. "Lutheran members bring a sense of the importance of public service and the vocation of public office. Our Lutheran perspective is that government is one place we find God active in our common life -- preserving order, protecting creation, helping people struggling with hunger and poverty, and building peace."

Other Lutherans in Congress are members of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod and Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod.

At the 2010 Elsie's Tea, members of TLC pooled their resources to finance a "microloan" through [Kiva](http://www.kiva.org). These microloans provide entrepreneurs all over the world an opportunity to expand or start their business with the goal of alleviating poverty. Once the loans are repaid, the money can be

reinvested, as it was in December. Below is information about recent loans:



Asia Muhammad Wali is a widow. She lost her husband as a result of a heart attack. This was a time of shock and great difficulties, but she overcame those difficulties with her courage and hard work.

Asia has applied for a loan from Kiva partner Asasah for her sewing business. With the loan, she will buy a new sewing machine because her old machine doesn't produce a good quality of work and takes much time to sew one dress. Now, Asia will be able to sew more dresses in less time and double her income.



Sajida lives in Kamoki. It is a small city in Punjab province and known for its rice production. It is also famous for its industrial importance in Pakistan's economy. Her husband's name is Muhammad Amin and he has a

business selling milk. He has some buffalos at his home that provide a good quantity of milk.

Sajida has applied for a loan from Kiva partner Asasah for her husband's business. With the loan, he will buy another buffalo to further expand his business. The additional buffalo will help him serve many more customers and make more income.

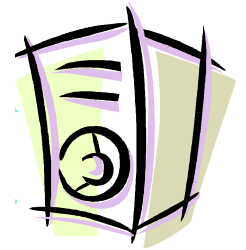
